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Premium Sale Requirements

Any 4-H member wishing to participate in premium auctions at county fair, need to annually complete the premium sale requirement form. This form was reviewed last year to put emphasis on virtual opportunities, serving as satisfactory replacement for in-person activities where applicable. The process encourages year-round 4-H engagement and involvement. FFA member (in counties where eligible for fairs) have a corresponding set of requirements. Flint Hills Farm to Fashion Camp

The Farm to Fashion Camp exposes middle and high school students to the sheep and wool industries through a highly hands-on and interactive camp experience.

This five-day camp introduces students to the fashion supply chain, sustainable fiber and fashion processes, and sheep husbandry. The camp includes opportunities for campers to interact directly with sheep and sheep farmers, as well as have hands-on experiences with activities such as spinning, dyeing, weaving, and fashion design.

On the last day of the camp, students will travel to visit a working sheep farm in the heart of the Flint Hills.

The camp is at Kansas State University Sheep and Meat Goat Facility from **June 26-30**. The program is free of charge to students, but it should be noted that overnight accommodations and food are not provided.

Vet Med ROCKS Camp

K-State's College of Veterinary Medicine is giving elementary, middle school, high school and college students an opportunity to experience "A Day in the Life of a Veterinary Student" at the 2023 Vet Med ROCKS summer camps.

July 30 will be a virtual day of presentations and at-home activities for high school and college students. These campers will then attend in person on July 31 for hands-on labs with faculty and vet med student camp counselors throughout the day. Aug. 1 will be an in-person camp for middle school students entering sixth through eighth grades, and August 2 is an in-person camp for grade school students entering the fourth and fifth grades.

Effective January 1, 2015, contestants who have judged as an official team member at the National Junior Horticulture Association Judging Contest are not eligible to compete as a team or as an individual at the State Kansas 4-H Horticulture Judging Contest.

NEW 4-H Foods & Nutrition Rule for Frostings & Fillings at Kansas State Fair

Please note that there is a *NEW* 4-H Foods & Nutrition Rule for the 2023 Kansas State Fair. The new rule is as follows:

For food safety purposes, any entries with frostings and fillings must calculate the amount of sugar in
the frosting/filling recipe only. Calculation must be attached to entry, or the placing will be lowered one
ribbon when judged. Frosting and fillings need to contain more than 65% sugar for safety. Examples on
how to calculate this percentage are included in the publication located at: https://bookstore.ksre.ksu.edu/pubs/MF3544.pdf.

While the concept has been encouraged and taught in previous years, it has not been a required item or stated in the rules. It has been added to the 2023 4-H Kansas State Fairbook. Please continue to stress the importance of the safety of frostings and fillings at all fairs and clarify that this new rule will be enforced at the 2023 Kansas State Fair in the 4-H Foods Division.

Champions Livestock Judging Camp

This is a three-day, intense judging camp designed for 4-H and FFA members (ages 14-18) who are seriously interested in enhancing their livestock judging and oral communication skills. Prior livestock judging experience is necessary for this camp. Workouts will be conducted similar to those at a collegiate level. Chris Mullinix, KSU livestock judging team coach, will conduct the training for each camp. The camp will focus primarily on the proper format, terminology, and presentation of oral reasons. Camp participants will also be exposed to livestock evaluation skills and incorporating performance records in the decision-making process.

Kansas 4-H Officials Estimate \$20.8M Impact of Volunteers in the State

The numbers are staggering.

- In 2022, the Kansas 4-H office reported a five-year average of 6,442 volunteers that have supported its youth programs, providing expert guidance on such projects as sewing, shooting sports, livestock, rocketry and nearly three dozen other pursuits.
- Sarah Maass, director of the Kansas 4-H program, https://kansas4-h.org, cited a study reporting that volunteers donate an average nine hours per month, or an estimated 695,736 hours annually to Kansas' largest youth development program.
- Also in 2022, Independent Sector a coalition of nonprofits, foundations and corporate giving programs released findings indicating that the value of one volunteer hour in the United States is \$29.95.
- Doing the math, the annual contribution of volunteers to the Kansas 4-H program tops \$20.8 million.
- Recognizing that impact, the Kansas 4-H program is joining in National Volunteer Week, a national
 celebration for non-profit groups set for April 16-22 to recognize the contributions of those who
 donate their time to worthy causes.
- "Volunteers have a passion to bring their time and knowledge to 4-H youth," said Bob Harlan, a retired engineer for the Landoll Corporation in Marysville, now living in Manhattan.
- Statistics don't always bear out the passion of volunteers like Harlan, who began as a project leader in the Hanover 4-H Club when his daughter wanted to participate in the photography project.
- "Three or four years later, I was asked to be a countywide project leader," he said. "My wife, Annette, was co-leader with me and we continued that until 2013. When the River Valley District was formed (in northcentral Kansas), all in that district were invited to our project meetings. In 1989, I joined the photography action team and am still a member of that team today."
- Ray Bartholomew of Hutchinson is the Reno County 4-H shooting sports coordinator and has been the countywide project club leader for 27 years.
- "I have a passion for working with youth and providing the basics of safety and fundamentals of the shooting sports disciplines," said Bartholomew, who worked for the USDA Farm Service Agency for 38 years prior to retirement.
- Bartholomew said he has obtained national Level II certification in archery and coordinator, and state Level I certification in archery, coordinator, hunting skills, pistol, rifle and western heritage/cowboy action. "Prior to 4-H certification training," he said, "I had limited background, particularly as it relates to competitive shooting events."
- Bartholomew estimates he has volunteered more than 1,500 hours per year to Kansas 4-H...for 23 years.
- Harlan's interest in photography was self-taught; he was asked to take pictures for advertising as part of his job. As he became involved in volunteering for 4-H, "I expanded my knowledge of photography to stay ahead of the youth."
- "Now," he adds, "photography is one of my main hobbies."

- Maass lauded Kansas' volunteers, noting they "add a tremendous amount of public value to our programs and the other organizations they serve."
- "From my perspective, the 4-H program's success is centered around being able to recruit and retain qualified adult volunteers," Bartholomew said. "With the vast variety of projects, no one 4-H agent would be expected to have the skill set nor the time to provide instruction and guidance for all projects."
- "Volunteers are key to expanding the impact of 4-H in the community."
